exploit: to make use of sth in a way that helps you or for your own advantage
lay out (one's vision): to detail or explain sth (sb's vision, plan, or a concept) explicitly
fundamental: essential, central
markup: the preparation of a text for printing (with the use of **markup indicators**, commonly called 'tags')
unleash: to release (e.g., a violent force) that cannot be controlled; cause it to become unrestrained
take off: to become successful or popular
advocate: to support or recommend (a particular action or plan) publicly; speak in favour of
royalties: payments (e.g., a fixed percentage of the profits) made to authors, musicians, etc. when their work is sold or performed
spark: to cause sth (e.g., an argument or fighting) to start happening; provoke, stimulate
node: a system or device connected to a network
flourish: to grow or develop successfully

indiscriminate: lacking discrimination; lacking careful thought or choice; random
consortium (pl. consortia & consortiums): a group of people or business firms that cooperate with each other
censorship: censoring of books, plays, films, etc., esp. by the government, because they are considered immoral or secret in some way
surveillance: close observation (e.g., by the police) of a person believed to be involved with criminal activity or a place where criminals gather
equity: fairness, fair treatment to all; impartiality
silos: a part of a system (e.g., a company or organization) that does not communicate or cooperate well with the other parts (v. **silos**)
say: (n.) (the right or opportunity to express) an opinion about sth
transparent: 1) if an object or substance is transparent, it enables you to see through it, 2) open, fair and honest (n. **transparency**)
permutation: 1) the way in which a set of things can be ordered; arrangement, 2) transformation
